Meet Today's Covid-19 Challenges with Lessons from 9/11 Heroes

Resiliency helps us not simply endure but prevail. To commemorate the 20th Anniversary of 9/11, the Human Resiliency Institute at Fordham University will offer a "Reclaiming the Sky" Resiliency Essay Competition beginning in Spring, 2021 and culminating in September, 2021. The program will give today's airport and airline employees, as well as aviation students – both aviation college and aviation high school students – a chance to tell how they can apply lessons of courage from the heroism of the 9/11 generation to help them prevail against Covid-19 and move forward with their lives.

"Reclaiming the Sky," by Tom Murphy, tells the story of a group of aviation employees in Boston, NY and Washington, DC and EWR/Newark, NJ, who came to work on the morning of September 11, 2001 expecting a normal day. Instead, they found themselves in the middle of an attack on America, one in which the aviation industry was used as the means. Despite great personal losses, including losing family and friends, they responded with courage that day and in the weeks and months that followed.

Covid-19 is a different kind of tragedy, but one with a devastating impact. The courage shown by the 9/11 generation can be an inspiration to help today's generation rebound from Covid-19 and find the strength to rise up in the face of personal and professional challenges - to move forward after the covid virus crisis.
